Childhood apraxia of speech (CAS) is an uncommon speech disorder in which a child has difficulty making accurate movements when speaking. In CAS, the brain struggles to develop plans for speech movement. With this disorder, the speech muscles aren't weak, but they don't perform normally because the brain has difficulty directing or coordinating the movements.

When a child has apraxia of speech, the messages do not get through correctly. The child might not be able to move their lips or tongue in the right ways, even though their muscles are not weak. Sometimes, the child might not be able to say much at all. A child with CAS knows what they want to say.

A child with apraxia of speech is on a “different” path, and has difficulty planning the movement sequences required for speech. This may result in inconsistent errors and difficulty with smooth transitions from sound to sound or syllable to syllable to form words, phrases, and sentences.

New to Apraxia - Apraxia Kids

Here are 10 early signs and symptoms of childhood apraxia of speech: Limited babbling, or variation within babbling. Limited phonetic diversity. Inconsistent errors. Increased errors or difficulty with longer or more complex syllable and word shapes. Omissions, particularly in word initial syllable shapes. Vowel errors/distortions.

10 Early Signs and Symptoms of Childhood Apraxia of Speech

Apraxia is a neurological speech disorder that affects a child’s ability to plan, program, execute, and sequence the precise movements of his tongue, lips, jaw, and palate that are necessary for intelligible speech. Characteristics that help make the diagnosis of apraxia: -Limited babbling as an infant -Few or no first words

A child who is a late talker and exhibits many of the following signs and symptoms should be evaluated to determine whether or not he or she has apraxia. Children who have subsequently diagnosed with verbal apraxia often share a history of some common signs. These children, during infancy, often engage in limited sound play and babbling.

It's different from aphasia, which is a problem with the use of words. The speech centers of the brain help plan and coordinate what a child would like to say.
